MEET THE TEAM

Mo Willems (Author, Book and Lyrics) began his career as a writer and animator for PBS' Sesame Street.. During his nine seasons at Sesame Street, Mo also served as a weekly commentator for BBC Radio and created two animated series. Mo began writing and drawing books for children.


His debut, *Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus!* became a New York Times Bestseller. In addition to picture books, Mo created the Elephant and Piggie books, a series of "Easy Readers", which were awarded the Theodor Seuss Geisel Medal in 2008 and 2009 and a Geisel Honor in 2011.

Deborah Wicks La Puma (Music) A composer, music director and orchestrator, Deborah Wicks La Puma is one of the most produced Theatre for Young Audiences artists working today. Some of her most popular musicals include *ELLA ENCHANTED* (based on the book by Gail Carson Levine), *OLIVERIO: A BRAZILIAN TWIST*, and *EINSTEIN IS A DUMMY* with playwright Karen Zacarías, and the off-broadway hit *SHE PERSISTED* (based on the book by Chelsea Clinton) with playwright Adam Tobin.

Leischen Moore (Music Director) is happy to back as the Musical Director for this production. Most recently she served as MD for *Holiday Inn* and *Anastasia* the last two Christmases at TMP. She has also music directed *Jesus Christ Superstar* at TLT, *Annie* at Auburn Avenue Theatre, and *James and the Giant Peach* and *Junie B. Jones* for Tacoma Family Theatre. She is often in front of the curtain, and was recently seen as Eliza Dolittle in *My Fair Lady*. Other favorite shows include: *25th Annual Putnum (Rona) Hello, Dolly!* (Irene Malloy), *Annie* (Grace Farrell), and *They're Playing Our Song* (Sonia Walsk). She holds vocal performance degrees from PLU and New York University. She is owner and voice teacher at Rare Bird Studios (www.rarebirdstudios.com) and adjunct professor of Musical Theatre for Pacific Lutheran University.

Lexi Barnett (Director) has worked as a director, choreographer, and teaching artist in the Puget Sound area for the past 14 years. She has served as Artistic Director of Broadway Olympia Productions, the head of KidCo. Productions and as Coordinator for TMP Family Theater. She holds her B.A. in Theatre Performance from Whitworth University and her Masters of Fine Arts in Directing and Theatre for Young Audiences from the University of North Carolina Greensboro.

Favorite projects include: *Anastasia* (Tacoma Musical Playhouse) *Songs for a New World* (Broadway Olympia) *Jesus Christ Superstar* (Tacoma Little Theatre) *Music Man* (Clinton Area Showboat) *A Year with Frog & Toad* (NCTYP), the NW regional premiere of *Spring Awakening* (Balagan Theatre), and *CATS* (Tacoma Musical Playhouse 2011).



AT THE THEATER

Live theater is incredibly exciting and fun for all ages, but can come with a bit of a learning curve for young audiences who are not used to the art form. Below are some tips and instructions to share with your students before attending the theater.


Remain seated the whole performances with your feet hanging off the seat, not tucked under yourself or kicking the seat in front of you.

Do not talk during the performance. It disrupts the actors and the other audience members. If an actor talks to you directly, it's okay to respond!

Use the restroom or get a drink of water BEFORE the show or during intermission (if there is one). Getting up during a performance can be distracting, so avoid it if you can!

Make sure to clap for things you enjoy and laugh at things you find funny! Actors appreciate the feedback!


After the show, the actors may line up in the lobby to greet you! Feel free to say hello and tell them something you enjoyed about the show!

Pre-Show Discussion Ideas

1. What is something you have always wanted to try?
2. What does it mean when someone says that something is “their thing”?
3. Would you let the pigeon drive the bus?
4. Should the bus driver have trusted the reader to watch the bus for him?

POST - SHOW CLASSROOM DISCUSSION


After attending the show, allow students to share their thoughts on the show and experience. Here are some guiding questions to keep the conversation going:


1. What was the biggest difference you noticed between the stories and the musical?
2. What character was your favorite?
3. Which character did you relate to the most?
4. What was your favorite song in the show?
5. What was your favorite moment in the show?

GIVE THE PIGEON A JOB

In *Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus*, Pigeon is trying to find what his “thing” is - what he is supposed to be doing in his life. Give your students a chance to help him decide, by designing what he would wear to this new job.
